Does it have an Octave and Sestet (if Italian) or three quatrains and a couplet (if Shakespearean?). Optional: Remember that Italian sonnets can have a couplet. In this case, the couplet replaces the last two lines of the sestet (but has a different rhyme scheme from the sestet – so it would be <i>cdcdee</i> , for example).
Does it have the proper rhyme scheme (abab cdcd efef gg for Shakespearean, abbaabba cdecde/cdcdd for a Italian?)
Does it have the proper meter? (Remember: Iambic Pentameter is a set of 5 stressed/unstressed syllables – think "dah-DUM dah-DUM dah-DUM dah-DUM dah-DUM" or "dah-DUM-dah")
Are there any misspelled words? What ones? How about "invented words?" - i.e., words that were made up for the purpose of filling in a rhyme?
What is the sonnet about? Are you able to tell?
